## Maggie Church - Vice President, Healthy and Resilient Communities, Conservation Law Foundation

Maggie earned her master's degree in City Planning at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where she was the recipient of the Wallace Floyd Award for City Design and Development and the MIT/DUSP Excellence in Public Service Award. She is a 1994 Truman Scholar and holds a master's degree in Urban Design from the Edinburgh College of Art and a BA in Architecture from Yale University. Maggie was honored to receive a Conservation Hero award from the National Park Service in 2015 for service to Groundwork USA, where she served as Board Chair from 2010 to 2015.

#### Josh Parrish – Director, American Forest Carbon Initiative

Josh Parrish is Director of the The Nature Conservancy's American Forest Carbon Initiative (AFCI). The AFCI provides forest carbon tools and incentives to forest landowners across the United States. Josh focuses on two primary strategies for expanding the Initiative across the United States. The first is working across The Nature Conservancy's business units to engage and enroll landowners in the Program by providing them with long-term innovative conservation solutions. The second strategy is developing and expanding the forest carbon credit sales pipeline by building relationships with corporations and interested purchasers.

#### Sacha Spector - Program Director for the Environment, Doris Duke Charitable Foundation

Dr. Sacha Spector is Program Director for the Environment at the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation, where he oversees all environmental and conservation grantmaking. Previously he has served as director of conservation science at Scenic Hudson, manager of the invertebrate conservation program at the American Museum of Natural History and was the Terrestrial Invertebrate Red List Authority for the IUCN Species Survival Commission. Author or co-author of over 30 research papers, books, and articles on conservation practices, he earned his PhD in ecology from the University of Connecticut and his BS in environmental biology from Yale.

# Sean Thackurdeen - Program Associate for the Environment, Doris Duke Charitable Foundation

Sean Thackurdeen is a biocultural conservationist and grantmaker working to uplift nature, people, and their wellbeing. Prior to joining the foundation, Sean spent seven years supporting a community-led conservation initiative to document and preserve the biodiversity, environmental culture, and languages of Vanuatu, an archipelago in the South Pacific. He graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in anthropology and environmental studies from Swarthmore College.

#### Karen Watts - Manager, Right Now Climate Fund, Amazon

Karen Watts manages Amazon's Right Now Climate Fund, a \$100 million commitment to support nature-based climate solutions as part of Amazon's commitment to The Climate Pledge to be net zero carbon by 2040. Amazon is actively reducing emissions within its operations through innovations and investments in renewable energy, electric vehicles, sustainable materials, efficient processes, and more. At the same time, Amazon's Right Now Climate Fund recognizes that to achieve IPCC pathways for mitigating the worst effects of climate change, we also need to go outside of our value chain and support nature's ability to reduce and remove carbon.

#### Leigh Whelpton - Program Director, The Conservation Finance Network

Since 2012, Leigh Whelpton has led CFN's efforts to advance land and resource conservation by increasing the use of innovative and effective funding and financing strategies. By expanding capacity, confidence, and connections among a growing network of public, private, and nonprofit professionals, CFN helps people find the capital they need to advance the pace and scale of their conservation efforts. Prior to this role, Leigh managed conservation initiatives and professional education for the Cheetah Conservation Fund in Namibia.
