Background on the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)


- Passed in November 2021
- Also referred to as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)
- \$1.2 trillion, with \$550 billion in new funding
 - Distributed over five years, 2022-2026
- Invests more than \$15 billion directly in Tribal Governments and Entities across the country





Breakdown of Funding

- The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law includes:
 - o more than **\$15 billion** in tribal specific funding measures and
 - An additional \$146.3 billion in competitive grant and cooperative agreement funding for which Tribal Nations and Tribal organizations are eligible to receive.
- These transformational investments span several traditional infrastructure sectors including:
 - Transportation
 - Water
 - Resilience
 - Energy
 - o Environment
 - Broadband







How we organized the programs

- For Tribes Only Programs: Only Tribal governments and entities are eligible to apply for and receive this funding (FTO)
- **Set Aside Programs:** A certain percentage / portion of funding for this program must be allocated to Tribal governments and entities (SET)
- Competitive Programs: Tribal entities are eligible to apply for and receive this funding alongside other entities such as states (COM)



Resilience



The bill is the largest investment in the resilience of physical and natural systems in American history. This includes substantial investments in programs for which Tribal Entities and governments.



















BIA Tribal Climate Resilience-Adaptation

- **Description:** Tribal Climate Adaptation programs provides support for climate resilient planning to help sustain Tribal ecosystems and natural and cultural resources, economies, infrastructure, human health, and safety.
- Eligible uses: Trainings and workshops, vulnerability and risk assessments, supplementary monitoring for climate-related decision making, scoping efforts, adaptation, planning, travel support, relocation, managed retreat, or protect in place planning, and internships.

Agency: Department of the Interior	Bureau: Indian Affairs
Amount: \$86 million	Funding mechanism: Annual Awards Program - Grants
Recipients: Federally recognized tribal governments	New Program?: No



















BIA Tribal Climate Resilience - "Community Relocation" *New*

- **Amount:** \$130 million
- **Description:** Implementation of "Community Relocation", "Managed Retreat", or "Protect-in-Place" Actions to increase climate resilience.
- Eligible uses: Funds are designed to support tribes facing questions and decisions regarding managed retreat, expansion, protect-in-place, and relocation options due to threats from intensifying coastal or riverine erosion, flooding and permafrost degradation impacts, sea level rise, and other impacts. Assessment, monitoring, planning, design, and implementation (of actions identified in existing planning documents or with appropriate baseline data) are allowable.



Ecosystem Restoration

- **Description:** To restore the ecological health of federal and private lands and waters, strengthen partnerships across State, Tribal, and other partners in restoring important ecosystems and watersheds, supporting Tribal climate resilience, and restoring culturally important lands.
- Eligible uses: \$400 million shall be for grants to states, territories and Tribes for implementing voluntary ecosystem restoration projects on public or private land.

Amount: \$2.13 billion	Funding mechanism: Grants

Ecosystem Restoration & America the Beautiful Challenge

- Through the America the Beautiful Challenge, National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) will leverage initial Federal commitments from the Department of the Interior (DOI), Department of Agriculture (USDA), and the Department of Defense (DOD) to raise additional philanthropic and private support, with the goal of directing at least \$1 billion in grants to communities over the next five years to support the America the Beautiful Initiative.
 - Conserving and restoring rivers, coasts, wetlands, and watersheds
 - Conserving and restoring forests, grasslands, and other important ecosystems that serve as carbon sinks
 - Connecting and reconnecting wildlife corridors, large landscapes, watersheds, and seascapes
 - Improving ecosystem and community resilience to coastal flooding, drought, and other climate-related threats
 - Expanding access to the outdoors, particularly in underserved communities

Broadband

The act invests \$65 billion to expand broadband, with \$2 billion in dedicated funding for a long-overdue expansion of broadband for Tribal entities and governments.





















Digital Equity Act of 2021

- Establishes that access to a broadband connection and digital literacy have become increasingly necessary for individuals to participate in society, the economy, and civic institutions; access health care and essential services; obtain education; and build careers.
- Digital Equity Act Programs: Dedicates \$2.75 billion to establish two grant programs that promote digital inclusion and equity to ensure that all individuals and communities have the skills, technology, and capacity needed to reap the full benefits of our digital economy:
 - The State Digital Equity Capacity Grant Program
 - → The State Digital Equity Planning Grant Program
 The State Digital Equity Competitive Grant Program

















State Digital Equity Capacity Grant *New*

• **Description:** To ensure that states have the capacity to promote the achievement of digital equity and support digital inclusion activities.

State Digital Equity Capacity Grant *New*

NTIA would calculate Capacity Grant amounts based on the following formula:

- 50% based on the population of the state in proportion to the total population of all eligible states;
- · 25% based on the number of individuals in the state who are members of covered populations in proportion to the total number of individuals in all eligible states who are members of covered populations; and
- 25% based on the comparative lack of availability and adoption of broadband in the state in proportion to the lack of availability and adoption of broadband of all eligible states.



State Digital Equity Competitive Grant *New*

Grants will be required to support at least one of the following activities:

- Develop and implement digital inclusion activities that benefit covered populations;
- Facilitate the adoption of broadband by covered populations for educational and employment opportunities;
- Implement training programs for covered populations that cover basic, advanced, and applied skills, or other workforce development programs;
- Provide equipment, networking capability, hardware and software, or digital network technology for broadband services to covered populations at low or no cost;
- Construct, upgrade, expand, or operate new or existing public access computing centers for covered populations through community anchor institutions.




Distance learning, Telemedicine, and Broadband Program: Reconnect Program

- **Description:** Facilitate broadband deployment in areas of rural America that currently do not have sufficient access to broadband. In facilitating the expansion of broadband services and infrastructure, the program will fuel long-term rural economic development and opportunities in rural America.
- Eligible uses: To build infrastructure and install equipment that provides modern, reliable, high-speed Internet service in rural America.

Agency: USDA	Bureau: Rural Utilities Service
Amount: \$1.92 billion	Funding mechanism: 100% Grant for Tribal Governments
Recipients: Federally recognized Indian tribes	New Program?: No



















ReConnect: Eligible Uses

- To fund the construction or improvement of facilities required to provide fixed terrestrial broadband service including buildings, land, and fixed wireless service.
- To fund reasonable pre-application expenses. May not exceed five percent of the award and must be included in the first request for advance of award funds and will be funded with either grant or loan funds.
- To fund the acquisition of an existing system that does not currently provide sufficient access to broadband (eligible for 100 percent loan requests only).

















More Details

- 100 Percent Grant for Tribal Governments and Socially Vulnerable Communities
 Up to \$350,000,000 is available for grants.
- If the applicant is a Tribal Government, or a corporation that is wholly owned by a Tribal Government, proposing to provide service on its own lands, **there is no matching fund requirement** and applicants may apply for grant funds to construct the broadband facilities.

Fish Passage - NOAA

Description: Removing in-stream barriers and providing technical assistance (barrier removal grants, new community-based restoration program)

Eligible uses: On the ground fish passage restoration projects, engineering and design, future project development phases, and building the capacity of new and existing restoration partners to design projects and manage multi-faceted construction efforts

Fish Passage - NOAA - Example

Reopening the Penobscot River

- The Penobscot Nation worked with NOAA and others to rework and remove dams in the river
- The project opened more than 30 miles of spawning habitat for sea-run fish including the alewife, American eel, and Atlantic salmon.





















Fish Passage - More details

- \$15 million per year
- No match requirements
- Funding is for: Design, engineering plans, construction
- Three year projects: year 1 = design and permitting / feasibility, year 2 and 3 = construction
- Funding is eligible to pay for staff to manage projects
- Federally recognized Tribes can apply directly or partner with Atlantic salmon
 Federation, The Nature Conservancy, Maine Coast Heritage Trust and others
- Projects range from a couple hundred thousand to several million
- o Tribal specific competition, broader competition that Tribes can also apply to

Tribal Transit Program (AKA Public Transportation on Indian Reservations)

- Description: Provides direct funding to Federally recognized Indian Tribes to provide public transportation service on and around Indian reservations or Tribal land in rural areas
- Eligible uses: Federally recognized tribes may use the funding for capital, operating, planning, and administrative expenses for public transit projects that meet the growing needs of rural tribal communities

Agency: Department of Transportation	Bureau: Federal Highway Administration
Amount: \$229 million	Funding Mechanism: Competitive grants and formula grants
Recipients: Federally recognized Indian Tribes	New program? No



















Tribal Transit Program

• The Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians will receive funding to purchase a loader and plow to maintain its transit facilities and routes to ensure continued services for its tribal members in Aroostook County. The equipment will be used to remove snow and debris from transportation facilities and transit routes through the winter months and for materials movement at facilities in Spring, Summer and Fall. (2019)

Tribal Transportation Program

- **Description:** To provide safe and adequate transportation and public road access to and within Indian reservations, Indian lands, and Alaska Native Village communities.
- Eligible uses: Transportation activities such as planning, design, and construction of transportation facilities, as well as addressing maintenance and transportation safety issues

Agency: Department of Transportation	Bureau: Federal Highway Administration
Amount: \$3 billion	Funding mechanism: Formula grant
Recipients: Federally recognized Tribal governments	New program? No

















More Details:

- Funding is provided to Tribes either as Tribal shares or as special set-aside funding to address transportation planning or safety and bridge projects and activities.
 - 5% set-aside for the BIA and FHWA to carry out program management and oversight, Tribes receive all other available TTP funding.
 - 2% of TTP funds are set-aside for Planning
 - 3% of TTP funds are set-aside for the TTP Bridge Program
 - 2% of TTP funds are set-aside for the TTP Safety Fund

Low Income Home Energy Assistance

- Description: The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program assists eligible low income households with their heating and cooling energy costs, bill payment assistance, energy crisis assistance, weatherization and energy-related home repairs
- Eligible uses: The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program provides federally funded assistance in managing costs associated with home energy bills, energy crises, weatherization and energy-related minor home repairs.

Agency: Department of Health and Human Services	Bureau: Administration for Children and Families
Amount: \$500 million over 5 years	Funding mechanism: Grant
Recipients: Tribal Governments (federally recognized), Tribal Governments (other than federally recognized), Indian Housing Authorities, and Consortia Authorized to Administer the Program by eligible Tribal Entities	Next milestone? No



















Low Income Home Energy Assistance

- The \$500 million included in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law is the Administration's third appropriation of LIHEAP funding in the past year.
 - O March 2021, Congress more than doubled the annual amount of LIHEAP funding appropriating \$4.5 billion in supplemental funding through the American Rescue Plan Act, in order to account for higher needs resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - O September 2021, Congress appropriated \$3.7 billion in annual LIHEAP funding through the Continuing Resolution. In total, the three appropriations mark a historic investment of nearly \$8 billion over a 12-month period.



Clean Water State Revolving Funds

- Description: The Clean Water State Revolving Fund program is a federal-state partnership that provides communities low-cost financing for a wide range of water quality infrastructure projects. Under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, 49 percent of Clean Water State Revolving Fund funds shall be eligible to be grants or 100 percent principal forgiveness loans.
- Eligible uses: State Revolving Fund programs provide financial assistance to local communities and publicly owned treatment systems for construction of wastewater and stormwater treatment facilities and collection systems; nonpoint source pollution management; construction, repair, or replacement of decentralized wastewater treatment systems; construction of nature-based infrastructure solutions; and other uses associated with the management of wastewater and stormwater.

- Traditionally used for "grey" water infrastructure, but EPA is interested in green infrastructure & conservation through the CWSRF

EPA Indian Reservation Drinking Water Program

- Agency: Environmental Protection Agency
- Amount: \$270 million
- Description: Funds projects that improve water quality, water pressure, or water services from a public water system
- 50% will go to pre-determined projects
